TROOP 68 OF BERKLEY HEIGHTS RECEIVES ROTARY COMMUNITY

SERVICE AWARD BY BERKLEY HEIGHTS

The Boy Scouts of Troop 68, a backbone of Berkeley Heights since 1936, have received the prestigious Rotary Community Service Award. This recognition is presented to the Scouts by their sponsoring organization, the Rotary Club of Berkeley Heights, and the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians.

Among the troop's contributions to the betterment of their community are setting up a temporary homeless shelter at St. Joseph's Shrine, assisting at Cub Scout Pinewood Derbies and graduation ceremonies, collecting food for homeless youth who have aged out of the foster care system, participating in the town's annual Relay for Life and Rotary Club Rubber Ducky Festival, gardening at the Wagner Farms Arboretum, and collecting trash and recycling for the Berkeley Heights Town Clean-Up Day. In addition, the Scouts have supervised children's games at the Mary Kay McMillin School's "Welcome Back" picnic, carried out ecological projects at the Summit Arboretum, and sorted food donations for local food banks. Troop 68's Life rank Scouts on their way to Eagle Scout status have led a variety of local improvement projects at the




Hughes and Woodruff schools, the Little-Lord Farmstead, and the Watchung Reservation and Deserted Village.

A project unique to Troop 68—initiated by Scout Alton Grossman—is the collection and delivery of children's toys to impoverished areas of the Appalachia area in West Virginia. Through this project, the Scouts have learned that these toys are often the only toys the children living in the region will receive during the winter holiday season.

This award was presented by Dr. Hal Daume, Rotary Club representative and Scouting Commissioner, to Senior Patrol Leader Doug Ladzinski and Assistant Senior Patrol Leader for Service Kyle Engemann.

Editor's Note: Less than 2,200 out of over 1,000,000 age-qualified Eagle Scouts have ever been selected for the BSA National Distinguished Eagle Scout Award. This is a special award indeed. All of us at IFSR are grateful for Hal and everything he does for Scouting and Rotary.

Dr. Hal Daume earned the Eagle Scout rank in 1957 and the Explorer Silver Award—the "Double-Eagle" as it was called—a year later. He was inducted into the Patriots' Path Council Eagle Scout Hall of Fame in 2008.

Hal's family has a long tradition of community service and Scouting. His grandfather was a multi-decade councilman of the Town West New York and mayor 1931-1935. His father received the BSA Silver Beaver Award in 1960. His Eagle Scout brother is a James E. West Fellow, and his younger son earned Eagle in 1998.

Hal is President of The Daumé Group, global consultants to Fortune 1000 clients.

He is former Managing Director of Research International-USA and has held senior posts with Audits & Surveys, Inc.; Ipsos Worldwide; and Marschalk Advertising. He has received two American Marketing Association Marketing Success of the Year awards.

He has served as Market Measurements Council and Futures Committee member of the Advertising Research Foundation; Director of the Chicago, Cleveland, and Southern California chapters of the American Marketing Association; and as featured speaker at the 52nd International Congress of the European Society for Opinion & Marketing Research.

For Rotary International, Hal served as District Governor in 2015-16, presiding over 39 Rotary Clubs representing over 1,000 individual members.

He is a member of the Alumni Association and Metropolitan Club of Stevens Institute of Technology, and was National Umpire and International Official at the 1996 Centennial Olympics-Atlanta.

A recipient of the Silver Beaver, Daniel Carter Beard Masonic Scouter, and Cliff Dochterman Rotarian Scouter awards, Hal is twice a James E. West Fellow and holds the rare Inter-American Scouting Association Order of the Condor recognition. He has been honored by the U.S. Army and the Iraqi Scouting Services-Green Zone Council.

Hal and Linda reside in Watchung, NJ. They have six children, four grandchildren, and one grand-dog.

LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT PDG MARK KRIEBEL



Happy New Year! As we begin 2017, I'd like to take the opportunity to share some thoughts on our great organization, let you know what I've been up to, and hopefully enlist you help for some important events this year.

Last October I had the opportunity of addressing the Tri-Annual Eurasian Scout Conference in Yerevan, Armenia about the long history between Scouting and Rotary, and how both organizations work together to develop youth into character driven ethical leaders. Along with an IFSR booth, I was able to meet with representatives of Scouting from Russia, Ukraine, Georgia, and other members from the old Soviet Union block of countries. Scouting is growing in those Countries as is Rotary, but it was interesting to note that while addressing the group and I asked for a show of hands of Rotarians, the only hands to raise were the interpreter in the translation booth (from Russia) and Bill Finnerty, a representative of **SCOUTING** the Boy Scouts of America, who was there to promote the upcoming 2019 World Jamboree in West

Virginia. I must say when I address groups in the US and Europe and I ask how many in the audience are both Scouts and Rotarians, the majority of hands are raised! As both Rotary and Scouting have only been active since the collapse of the Soviet Union, there is a lot of potential for both organizations to grow there and hopefully IFSR will be able to assist in their efforts on both fronts. While there, I was approached by a Ukrainian Scout leader who wanted to share with me the support our own International Commissioner Brian Thiessen provided in making a Rotary grant in support of Scouting available in the Ukraine. Thanks Brian!

Upcoming are two events that are important to the IFSR and I'm asking you to consider attending and/ or helping at both: The Rotary International Convention in Atlanta in June, and the BSA National



Jamboree in West Virginia in July. This newsletter has the information you need on both events including who to contact to help.

We are all fortunate to be members of two organizations that are working to create a better World – and as members of the IFSR it is incumbent on all of us to help Scouting, Rotary and the IFSR grow! 
CLIFF DOCHTERMAN, AN ORAL HISTORY

The IFSR is dedicated to Service to Youth, and in particular to service to Scout and Guide units. Rotarians have found many ways to serve Scout and Guide units, and now there is an IFSR award they can receive for serving a Scout or Guide unit and having it mentioned in the media, any media outlet, the IFSR Youth Service Award.

The IFSR Youth Service Award may be awarded to any Rotary Club that renders service in support of Scout and/or Guide units which is publicized in the media, any media. The IFSR Webmaster may give the awards to a club annually. Recipients are selected from articles posted in media or online. Such articles may be brought to the attention of the IFSR webmaster [webmaster@scouters.us].

This is not a Scouting award nor a Rotary award, but an IFSR award and is intended to reward Rotary Clubs who support local Scout and/or Guide Units and have their support publicized in the media or online.

To ensure that the award is available worldwide in a timely manner, it is only distributed electronically. The recipient club will be notified of the award and given instructions on how to download and print the certificate. The award can be downloaded and printed by the club themselves or at a print center.

It is hoped that these awards will stimulate Rotary Clubs to become more involved in service to youth and in particular to Scout and Guide units. Hopefully these Rotarians will become more aware of the IFSR and the services it provides to Rotarians in their support of Scout and Guide units. 

"Commanding Officers at the front frequently said that they found soldiers who had been Boy Scouts were specially useful for trench warfare because they knew how to hide themselves and how to creep about in the dark without losing their way. As you know, most of the work of raiding and attacking is done by night in order to avoid being seen by the enemy. One officer who had used Boy Scouts for this work was at his wits' end when he tried to use other soldiers - they were too clumsy. Scouting improves mental health - Being a Scout or Girl Guide helps to lower the risk of mental illness later in life, according to researchers from Edinburgh and Glasgow universities. From their study of 10,000 people from across the United Kingdom who were born in 1958, they discovered a significant number of those who participated in the movements as children tended to have better mental health at age 50. In fact, former Scouts and Girl Guides were 15% less likely to suffer from anxiety or mood disorders compared with others. Building resilient kids is also another big benefit of being involved in the Scout Movement. Scouts participate in many outdoor activities and major events like Jamborees where they are away from home for up to 14 days, learning how to care for themselves and others.

The Boy Scouts of Bahrain (جمعية كشافة البحرين) was founded in 1953, and became a member of the World Organization of the Scout Movement in 1970. The Boy Scouts of Bahrain has 2,301 members as of 2011.

The small Bahraini Scout organization often participates in cooperative events with neighboring Kuwait and Qatar. Scouts are involved in community service such as cleaning polluted areas and spraying insecticides, giving blood and helping to organize blood donor services, assistance at sports events and taking charge of first aid at schools.

Sections include Al-Ashbal (Cub Scouts)-8 to 12; Al-fetian (Boy Scouts)-12 to 14; Al-Matakadem (Rovers)-14 to 18; and a section for handicapped Scouts.

There are American Boy Scouts in Manama. The troop's membership generally is drawn from Americans and occasionally foreign nationals attending Bahrain School.

The Bahrain School also sponsors a Cub Scout unit for younger boys. There is another BSA Cub Scout unit (Pack 820) that meets on the western side of the island that is unaffiliated with any school. The majority of the membership is American, British, and Filipino.

British Scouting has had a long history of Scouting in the Middle East. In Bahrain, British Scouting organizations have operated from at least the early 1950s with multiple Groups operating previously at different locations.
