YOUTH SERVICE AWARDS 2ND HALF 2019

The IFSR is dedicated to Service to Youth, and in particular to service to Scout and Guide units. Rotarians have found many ways to serve Scout and Guide units, and they can receive the IFSR Youth Service Award for serving a Scout or Guide unit and having it mentioned in the media, any media outlet.

The IFSR Youth Service Award may be awarded to any Rotary Club that renders service in support of Scout and/or Guide units which is publicized in the media, any media. The IFSR Webmaster may give the awards to a club annually. Recipients are selected from articles posted in media or online. Such articles may be brought to the attention of the IFSR webmaster [webmaster@scouters.us].

This is not a Scouting award nor a Rotary award, but an IFSR award and is intended to reward Rotary Clubs who support local Scout and/or Guide Units and have their support publicized in the media or online.

To ensure that the award is available worldwide in a timely manner, it is only distributed electronically. The recipient club will be notified of the award and given instructions on how to download and print the certificate. The award can be downloaded and printed by the club themselves or at a print center.

It is hoped that the example provided by the clubs earning these awards will serve as an example on how Rotary Clubs can become more involved in service to youth and in particular to Scout and Guide units. Hopefully these Rotarians will become more aware of the IFSR and the services it provides to Rotarians in their support of Scout and Guide units. 
Demopolis Rotary Club (AL); September 4, 2019, The West Alabama Watchman. (award)


Elkins Rotary Club (WV); July 22, 2019, The Inter-Mountain. (award)


Old Pueblo Rotary Club (AZ); <u>September 28, 2019</u>, Tucson.com. (<u>award</u>)

THE GLOBAL BIG 6 YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS CALL FOR MORE INVESTMENT IN NON-FORMAL EDUCATION: Formed in 1996, the Big 6 Youth Organizations are an alliance of leading international youth-serving organizations t including: YMCA, YWCA, WOSM, WAGGGS, Red Cross/ Red Crescent Societies, and The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award Foundation. Together, the Big 6 Youth Organizations actively involve over 250 million young people. Supported by the involvement of adults, these organizations have contributed to the non-formal education of more than a billion young people during the last century. The paper emphasizes that non-formal education is an essential form of education and calls for more balance between the different education and learning dimensions. Non-formal education, best suited to help young people acquire life skills, values, and resilience to social changes, is often underestimated. The joint position further calls for increasing the recognition of non-formal education and its learning outcomes, as well as an increase in funding to non-formal education providers and its associated infrastructure (i.e. youth centers). Scouting in Cambodia

The national Scouting organization in Cambodia was founded in September 2005 through the merger of the Scout Organization of Cambodia and the Cambodian Scouts (Khmer and became a member of the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) on 1 July 2008 The original Khmer Scout Association was created in 1934. André Lefèvre, chief of the Eclaireurs de France, set up a training camp for 60 Scoutmasters from all over French Indochina. At the end of 1937, French Scouting sent Scoutmaster Raymond Schlemmer to the Cambodian, Laotian, and Vietnamese areas of Indochina to oversee the setting up of the Fédération Indochinoise des Associations du Scoutisme in all three regions. From 1939 through 1945, the political situation affected Scouting activities all across the country, as World War II engendered a movement for an independent Cambodia. The French began to lose control and were finally overthrown by Japanese intervention. This ceased the French Scouts' activity in Cambodia, as well as all Scouting activities. In 1956, the Cambodian Scouting movement was transformed into the Scouts of the Queen. In 1957, under the direction of socialistleaning Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the Angkar Khemarak Kayarith was transformed into the Royal Socialist Khmer Youth with Sihanouk himself serving as president of the state ruled organization, now controlled by the Royal government. The 2,000 members and the leaders of Cambodian Scouting were permitted by the government to carry on activities. On 1 November 1964, Prince Sisowath Essaro, announced the dissolution of the Cambodian Boy Scout Association, whose members were subsequently integrated into the Jeunesse Socialiste Royale Khmer, a government-sponsored socialist youth movement. In 1972, the Cambodian Scouts were reestablished for a short period but In 1975, the movement was banned by the Khmer Rouge communist regime. As the political system changed in the country, Scouting was gradually reestablished and Scout groups were organized in the refugee camps at the Thai borderr. Subsequently, two main Scout groupings emerged in Cambodia and were registered in July 2000; the Scout Organization of Cambodia and the Cambodian Scouts. Both Scout associations were run by rival political parties. For this reason, WOSM could not admit either of them as a member. In September 2005, the National Association of Cambodian Scouts was created and full WOSM membership was granted on 1 July 2008

The first World Forum on Non-formal Education convened by the Scout Movement kicks off in Rio de Janeiro

December 10, 2019



The World Non-Formal Education Forum, convened by the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM), UNICEF, UNFPA and the Office of the UN Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth, kicked off in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil on December 9th and will run until December 11th. The Forum is the first convening of its kind offering an international platform for ideas on non-formal education and aiming to explore how organizations can keep pace with the latest trends in non-formal education and contribute towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

"Non-formal education is a prerequisite for meaningful engagement in modern society. We are witnessing the largest generation of youth the world has ever seen, and it is our responsibility to ensure that every young person has access to opportunities that allow them to thrive in this rapidly changing society," said Ahmad Alhendawi, Secretary General of the Scout Movement, who also serves on the Ban Ki-moon Centre's Board.

Moderated by Alhendawi, the first plenary session was held under the theme of "A Changing World of Learning: Where does Non-Formal Education fit in?" where BKMC CEO Monika Froehler featured as a key speaker.

She said "a life-long learning is incredibly important and non-formal education is actually much faster than formal education and is a pioneer in the life-long learning platform."

"We need people that have urgency. We need people with a global citizenship mindset, "quoting Jack Ma, Founder of Alibaba Group and Jack Ma Foundation, Froehler said that this is exactly what non-formal education says.

Contrary to the notion that education happens only through the formal educational curriculum, nontormal education is what happens in places such as youth organizations and clubs, and community groups where young people meet to undertake projects together, facilitate peer-to-peer learning, and engage in activities like camping, music and community service. Research highlights the increasing relevance of non-formal in building a wide-range of competencies that are necessary for a changing-world.

Jayathma Wickramanayake, the UN Youth Envoy, stressed that there should be "mutual respects across generations and within the generation." Leading the youth panel discussion, she agreed that young people should not be expected to bring new solutions but rather that they are here to encourage the decision-makers to actually implement the solutions.
