Certified as a Senior Ecologist, Wildlife Biologist, Wetland Scientist, and Environmental Inspector. 1969 – Present, Full Professor of Biology, Grove City College; President and Chief Scientist, Brenner's Ecological Service; President and CEO Urban Wetland Institute; Member of 25 Professional Societies, including American Association for the Advancement of Science and American Institute of Biological Science. He holds many honors including to name just a few: Who's Who Among American's Teachers, Who's Who in the World, Who's Who in Education, Who's Who in Religion, Outstanding Educators in America, Silver Beaver, St. George Award, National Episcopal Church, Life Time Achievement Award, Fellow American Association for the Advancement of Science, James E West Fellow, and Paul Harris Fellow (+9).

Dr. Brenner is Past President of French Creek Council, BSA; Past President National Association Academies of Science; Past District Govenor for Rotary District 7280; and Chairman for the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He is the author of over 200 professional publications and the Editor of 14 technical books. He is a private consultant on water quality, wetlands, reclamation of devastated lands for individuals, engineering and legal firms and government agencies.



Just some of Dr. Brenner's service and accomplishment In Scouting not already mentioned above are: Eagle Scout and Vigil honor member of the Order of The Arrow and a Woodbadge course director. He has served on two National Jamboree Staffs, many council positions including Council President. He also currently serves at the Executive level on his Council and at the Northeast Region, and at local and district level positions with Rotary. And finally now we can introduce Dr. Frederic J. IFSR Member Teaches Life Saving, Then: New Providence Teen Rescues Drowning Father



Brian Urness, 15 year old Boy Scout of Troop 1 in New Providence, was awarded the Honor Medal from the Boy Scouts of America for rescuing his father, Mark Urness, after he nearly drowned while vacationing in Michigan this past August. Brian pulled his father to safety from the bottom of Lake Michigan – some 10-feet down – and swam him back to shore.

"I've never been in a situation like this," said Brian, who swam for years with the Summit Seals and is now a member of the Crestview swim team. "I just reacted. I didn't have time to think. I thought, 'OK, Boy Scouts — just how they taught me,' and mentally stayed strong."

Perhaps, there are no coincidences. Just three days before embarking on vacation, Brian had completed the Life Saving merit badge. His entire family credits his Boy Scout training in water life-saving techniques for saving his father's life. "It's a wonderful story of a series of circumstances where a young man knew exactly what to do and he did it," said **Hal Daume**, of Berkeley Heights. Mr. Daume **served as Brian's Life Saving merit badge counselor** and went on to say, "This is what it's all about: Go back to the Boy Scout motto – he was prepared."

The Honor Medal is awarded when someone has demonstrated unusual heroism and skill in saving or attempting to save a life at considerable risk to self. On the average about 30 of these awards are given annually across the country. Brian was awarded the Honor Medal from the Boy Scouts of America. Can You Top This? Rotarians Honoring Scouts



I'm happy to report that, in Rotary District 7510 (New Jersey counties of Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Somerset, and Union), since July 2008 we have presented over 350 IFSR Certificates of Achievement to Eagle Scouts and Girl Scout Gold Awards, and we expect to top 360 by June this year. Over two dozen of our clubs and nearly 60 Rotarians have been directly involved in this initiative. (For any Rotary District Representative interested in starting up this initiative, I'd be happy to provide the details of how we've made this a successful part of our "new generations" avenue.

Editors Note: This is more terrific work by Hal Daume showing just some of what we can actually do as Rotary to support and promote Scouting and the relationship between our organizations. Where could we find better future members of Rotary than these Scouts?! I have included Hal's "how to" do this so many of you out there that want to can simply follow the template he has set up, proven, and now is sharing with us.

Hal says: I started in the spring and summer of 2008 by meeting with key high-level people at the two BSA councils that our district overlaps: Central New Jersey Council and Patriots' Path Council. Once I explained what we were planning to do, I created a "Certificate Presentation Request" form that each council printed up and made available at their service centers, and asked that these be promoted at monthly "roundtable" meetings of troop leaders. I did the same with the Girl Scout councils. Next, I promoted the program at Rotary district events and also visited some three dozen Rotary Clubs, making brief presentations of the program, explaining that their own Rotarians-not me--would be making the presentations, and that this program would be funded completely by the district--it would cost the clubs nothing to participate except for "manpower" to go out and visit Eagle Scout courts of honor and Girl Scout Gold Award events.

Then, I bought several hundred IFSR Eagle and Gold Award certificates and a batch of certificate folders, and wrote "scripts" for the presenters (attached), plus mailing envelopes (the four District Governors in office since July 2008 have very kindly provided annual budget line items to cover the ongoing material costs). I also wrote a "release" that appeared in the July 2008 "TEAM Rotary" district newsletter, to alert clubs and Rotarians about this new initiative (attached).

The request form (I've attached the one for Eagle) is filled out by the BSA or GSUSA troop and sent to me. On receipt, I contact the Rotary Club closest to the town in which the troop is located and alert them to the upcoming event, requesting that they identify one of their members who will make the presentation (importantly, I rarely make presentations myself—a secondary goal of this program is club-to-community outreach). Once identified, the presenting Rotarian will receive a packet from me via mail. The packet will contain information on date, location, and contact; the certificate in presentation folder (to be signed by the presenting Rotarian), and the script (which can be used as written or as a "springboard" for extemporaneous remarks). I ask the presenters to try to obtain a photo of the presentation, which is subsequently emailed to me for file and for further program promotion.




The count has just exceeded 360, and some four dozen Rotarians have made these presentations, representing over two dozen of the 42 clubs in our district. We've made presentations in all five of the New Jersey counties our district covers. I sometimes receive feedback from presenters, one of which--from Victoria DeGuzman--I've attached.

In some cases, we may not have a presenter, or the troop making the request is in a county outside our district's boundaries. Instead of turning down a request like this, I'll mail a certificate and enclose a letter to the new Eagle scout (attached). This, I believe, keeps the spirit of this program intact.

The only thing the district doesn't pay for is postage; it's simply too much of a nuisance to try to keep receipts for this, so I've simply absorbed this expense personally. (Small price to pay for so many happy Rotarians...and Scouts!) (For estimating purposes, the cost-per packet including postage is under \$5.00-- A bargain, IMHO!)

Waco, Texas (April 10, 2012)- One hundred years after Arthur Eldred of New York earned the first Eagle Scout Award from the Boy Scouts of America, researchers with Baylor University's Institute for Studies of Religion (ISR) and Program on Prosocial Behavior have released findings from a nationwide, scientific survey that demonstrates the significant, positive impact Eagle Scouts have on society - from holding leadership positions in their workplace and neighborhood to voting and volunteering to protecting the environment and being prepared for emergencies.

"There is no shortage of examples or anecdotal accounts that suggest Scouting produces better citizens, but now there is scientific evidence to confirm the prosocial benefits of Scouting or earning the rank of Eagle Scout," said the study's principal investigator, Byron R. Johnson, Ph.D., Distinguished Professor of the Social Sciences, director of the Program on Prosocial Behavior and ISR co-director. "The central question of this study was to determine if achieving the rank of Eagle Scout is associated with prosocial behavior and development of character that carries over into young adulthood and beyond."

With funding from a major two-year research grant from the John Templeton Foundation, Baylor researchers with ISR's Program on Prosocial Behavior partnered with the Gallup Organization to conduct a nationwide random survey of 2,512 adult males. Minutes of the Meeting

- 1. Invocation was done by President Brian D. Thiessen
- 2 Self Introductions proceeded for all those in attendance which included among others those who signed in Bud and Jeanne Allison (Texas Past IFSR President), Steven I. Aloga, (Nigeria), Maged B. M. Badawy (Egypt), David Barton (Australia Chair of Asia Pacific Region), Patrick Biluk (Canada), Holger Dybdahl (Denmark), Joe Grabill (USA), David and Christine Judge (England Past IFSR President), Marcos Ricardo Klitzke (Brazil), Zdenek & Jarmila Michalek (Czech Republic), Ray and Carol Paler (USA), Ranjan Rajavasan (Sri Lanka), Katherine Shields (Australia), Rachaneewan Sirinawin (Thailand), John Sokol (USA), Carolyn and Brian Thiessen (California President IFSR), Harmonie Wong (Canada), Prof Yongyudh Vajaredel (Thailand).
- 3. Danish Jamboree 21-29 July Holstebro. We will have an IFSR booth at the upcoming Denmark Jamboree interested folks who can help were invited to contact President Brian and/or Holger Dybdahl.
- 4. Minutes of last meeting were discussed as shown in <u>Scouting</u>
 <u>Rotarian</u>/Web site and Treasurer's Report related to present solvency
 and business activities
- 5. It was announced that there are 650+ Cliff Dochterman award recipients 1100+ active members of IFSR and 50+ nations now actively represented.
- 6. Silver Wheel presented to Zdenek Michalek. IFSR presented IFSR's highest award for service to IFSR the Silver Wheel to Zdenek Michalek of the Czech Republic. Zdenek was a Scouter when Scouting was illegal in his homeland he taught Scouting skills and character development when it was punishable by prison time. After the fall of the Iron Curtain Zdenek was instrumental in redeveloping Scouting in that area and then raising funds and building a \$1 Million+ Scout Center dedicated to Czech and International Scouts in the Czech Republic and used also by the community.



7. Other Business items discussed:

- * Staffing IFSR booths. Members are encouraged to staff future Exhibit areas including Intl. and World Jamborees as well as Rotary Zone meetings. Lists of upcoming areas are listed in <u>Scouting</u> Rotarian.
- * Membership Roster. There was lively discussion regarding availability of the membership roster on the website, and suggestions included password protecting the database, offering online specific queries only, as well as a member's ability to "opt out" of a directory. The present policy is intended to offer maximum member privacy, and queries may be made directly of any officer or the Executive Secretary directly. It was suggested that this continue to be discussed with the incoming IFSR administration and leadership in an effort to be as responsive as possible to the IFSR general membership.
- * Newsletter and Web Site. Members were encourages to submit Photos of youth in action together with Rotarians along with brief narratives article for publication in the <u>Scouting Rotarian</u> and the web site.
- * WOSM Memorandum of Understanding. There was an extensive discussion of the present and past positions of the World Organization of Scouting Movements vis-a-vis IFSR. After strong lobbying, WOSM has agreed to enter into a Consultative Memorandum of Understanding which shall automatically renew in the absence of any action taken to dissolve it IFSR will be invited to participate in World Scout Conferences, Regional Scout Conferences, etc. and WOSM to participate with IFSR at IFSR events at Rotary International Conferences, Zone Institutes, etc. Final wording is in the hands of the attorneys. [Ed. note: May God help us all!]
- * It was estimated that 35 new members were added to the rolls at this Convention and that 5 countries are either new to IFSR or have their first active members now. It was suggested to the assembled membership that recruiting is everyone's job and that District Conferences, PETS, and Zone Institutes are ideal recruiting ground.
- * A suggestion was made to increase Scout/Guide participation in RI Conventions in flag ceremonies and in the IFSR booth. While it appears unanimously popular with our membership, it appears that RI Board members and the RI staff in particular, do not yet endorse this view as a whole although it varies from RI President to President depending on their Scouting/Guiding history.





Further discussion focused on opportunities for Scouts/Guides to work hand in hand as volunteers together with Rotaractors and Interactors. A member from the Sri Lankan contingent noted that some Governors appear to suffer from an allergic reaction to Scouting, and after hearty laughter, the consensus seemed to be that only continued strong exposure can cure them of this malady - i.e. education to show them that we are not in competition but complementary to New Generations Avenue of Service.

8. Election of 2012-13 officers of IFSR. Joe Grabill made a motion to approve the slate of Officers for the new year as recommended by IFSR's Nominating Committee. The Motion was seconded by R. Subrmanian. The voice vote was unanimous for approval and election.

David Judge made the Motion to Adjourn, and the membership affirmed it by voice.
